Dear Norma:

A car stalling after being driven a short distance can be caused by a variety of faults with the engine. Start by checking that there is no debris in the fuel line. If it is clear, check the jubilee clips holding the vacuum pipes onto the inlet manifold. If none of these approaches solves the problem, it could be that the fuel pump itself is faulty, causing low delivery pressure to the carburetor float chamber. I hope this helps.

JULY 28, 2007 (THIRD QUARTER) NATIONAL BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING REPORT

SENT TO NORG BY NATIONAL PRESIDENT CRAIG GORRIS. (CONDENSED)

Business Manager's Report: Income is ahead of budget projections and memberships are still holding strong due to a strong first quarter.

Website Report (www.earlyfordv8.org): The new website should be available in August.

Restoration Guidelines: 1932 Ford (Revised) should be sent to publishers early next year; 1935-36 Pickups in process ('37 pickup might be included); 1937 Ford - Hope to receive press-ready version in September; 1952-53 Ford and 1949-51 Mercury in process.

Accessories: A woman's charm bracelet is being developed that will allow miniature emblems of each National Meet to be attached. An effort is underway to produce a cookbook complete with V-8 anecdotes. Mid-Atlantic Director Dave Collette is assisting with the project. NORG MEMBERS: PLEASE BRING YOUR RECIPES TO THE SEPTEMBER 21 MEETING. THE NATIONAL DEADLINE FOR RECEIPT OF RECIPES IS SEPTEMBER 24, 2007!

Early Ford V-8 Foundation: Reported special addition to the Auburn-Cord-Duisenberg Show and Kruse Auction to be held in Auburn, IN the first part of September. (NORG members should have already received information from Auburn-Kruse about this.)

National Meets: Western National Meet drew about 273 vehicles, and a new record was set for Central Meets with over 219 registrations; Eastern Meet numbers not yet in. The 2008 Grand National Meet in Dearborn will be the third week in July, with Craig and Annette Gorris as Chairpersons; early registration forms are available on line at www. earlyfordv8.org. The Connecticut Regional Group has expressed interest in the 2009 Eastern Meet and both the Texas and Northern Illinois Regional Groups are considering hosting the 2009 Central Meet. To date, no Group has come forward for the Western Meet. North Carolina is considering the 2010 Eastern Meet. No decisions have yet been made on any of these meets except the 2008 Grand National Meet.

Membership: Another 4000 Membership Flyers are in print. Some V-8 vendors have been offered comparable space in the *V-8 Times* if they print EFV8CA membership forms in their catalogs.

Policy Manual Changes: Additional responsibilities will be added for the President and outgoing Directors to help orient new Directors. Directors can now request payment for two nights lodging when attending the annual "face-to-face" Directors Meeting.

Judging Standards Committee: Acceptance of radial tires on Concourse and the need for a Dearborn Emeritus Plaque were referred to the Judging Standards Committee.

Addition of 1954-1959 Ford Company Vehicles: The majority of the Board did not believe it beneficial to add these vehicles.

New Regional Group Handbooks: A copy is available at wmcbrown@frontiernet.net .

Revision of National Meet Guidelines: A committee is revising the National Meet Guidelines, which were last revised in 1999.



Tips for saving gas and money

From a man who has been in the petroleum pipeline business for about 31 years, currently working for the Kinder-Morgan Pipeline in San Jose, CA. We deliver about 4 million gallons in a 24-hour period from the pipe line; one day it's diesel, the next day it's jet fuel and gasoline. We have 34 Storage tanks here with a total capacity of 16,800,000 gallons.

Here are some tricks to help you get your money's worth.

- 1. Fill up your car or truck in the morning when the temperature is still cool. Remember that all service stations have their storage tanks buried below ground; and the colder the ground, the denser the gasoline. When it gets warmer gasoline expands, so if you're filling up in the afternoon or in the evening, what should be a gallon is not exactly a gallon. In the petroleum business, the specific gravity and temperature of the fuel (gasoline, diesel, jet fuel, ethanol and other petroleum products) are significant. Every truckload that we load is temperature-compensated so that the indicated gallonage is actually the amount pumped. A one-degree rise in temperature is a big deal for businesses, but service stations don't have temperature compensation at their pumps.
- 2. If a tanker truck is filling the station's tank at the time you want to buy gas, do not fill up; most likely dirt and sludge in the tank is being stirred up when gas is being delivered, and you might be transferring that dirt from the bottom of their tank into your car's tank ..
- 3. Fill up when your gas tank is half-full (or half-empty), because the more gas you have in your tank the less air there is and gasoline evaporates rapidly, especially when it's warm. The extra gas also helps keep your gasoline in-tank pump from getting too hot in the summer and wearing out sooner than they should. (Gasoline storage tanks have an internal floating 'roof' membrane to act as a barrier between the gas and the atmosphere, thereby minimizing evaporation)
- 4. If you look at the trigger you'll see that it has three delivery settings: slow, medium and high. When you're filling up do not squeeze the trigger of the nozzle to the high setting. You should be pumping at the slow setting minimizing vapors created while you are pumping.
- 5. Hoses at the pump are corrugated; the corrugations act as a return path for vapor recovery, from gas that already has been metered. If you are pumping at the high setting, the agitated gasoline contains more vapor, which is being sucked back into the underground tank, so you're getting less gas for your money.

TIME TO COOK

BAKER'S® ONE BOWL Cream Cheese Brownies

Prep Time: 15 min Total Time: 55 min

Makes: 32 servings, 1 square each

4 squares BAKER'S Unsweetened Baking Chocolate

3/4 cup (1-1/2 sticks) butter 2-1/2 cups sugar, divided

5 eggs, divided

1-1/4 cups flour, divided

1 pkg. (8 oz.) PHILADELPHIA Cream Cheese, softened

PREHEAT oven to 350°F. Line 13x9-inch baking pan with foil, with ends of foil extending over sides of pan. Grease foil

MICROWAVE chocolate and butter in large microwaveable bowl on HIGH 2 min. or until butter is melted. Stir until chocolate is completely melted. Add 2 cups of the sugar; stir until well blended. Add 4 of the eggs; mix well. Stir in 1 cup of the flour until well blended. Spread batter into prepared pan.

BEAT cream cheese, remaining 1/2 cup sugar, remaining egg and remaining 1/4 cup flour in same bowl with wire whisk until well blended. Spoon over brownie batter. Cut through cream cheese mixture with knife several times for marble effect.

BAKE 35 to 40 min. or until toothpick inserted in center comes out with fudgy crumbs. (Do not overbake.) Cool in pan on wire rack. Lift brownies from pan, using foil handles. Cut into 32 squares. Store in tightly covered container at room temperature.

HELPFUL HINTS

Blue Dawn dishwashing liquid

There are some things we must believe by faith and just not question. One is that original blue Dawn dishwashing liquid has some kind of magical powers. But it has to be the original blue that is made in the USA. Don't ask. We don't know why, only that it's true. Provided it's blue, of course. **Scum.** Dawn dishwashing liquid has some mysterious quality about it that makes it "melt"

through stubborn soap scum and hideous build-up on showers and tubs, no matter whether porcelain, acrylic or fiberglass. Use it straight up and you'll bless the day you read this tip.

Stains. Original blue Dawn gets just about any kind of spot out of washables. Keep a small squeeze bottle in the laundry room so it's always handy.
